THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

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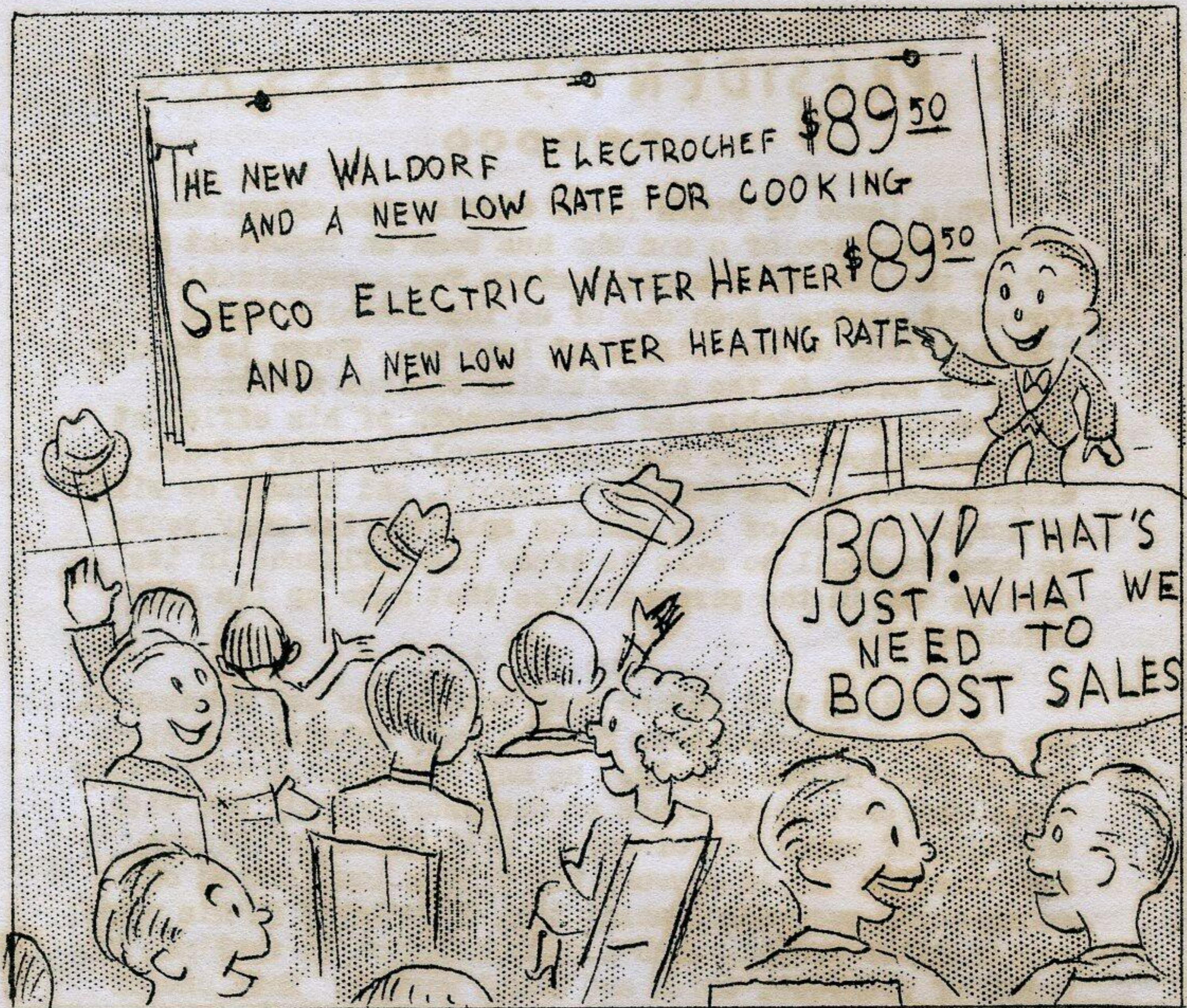

Ruth Morgan and husband spent Sunday, Feb. 25, in Louisiana watching Azaleas bloom - and other things.

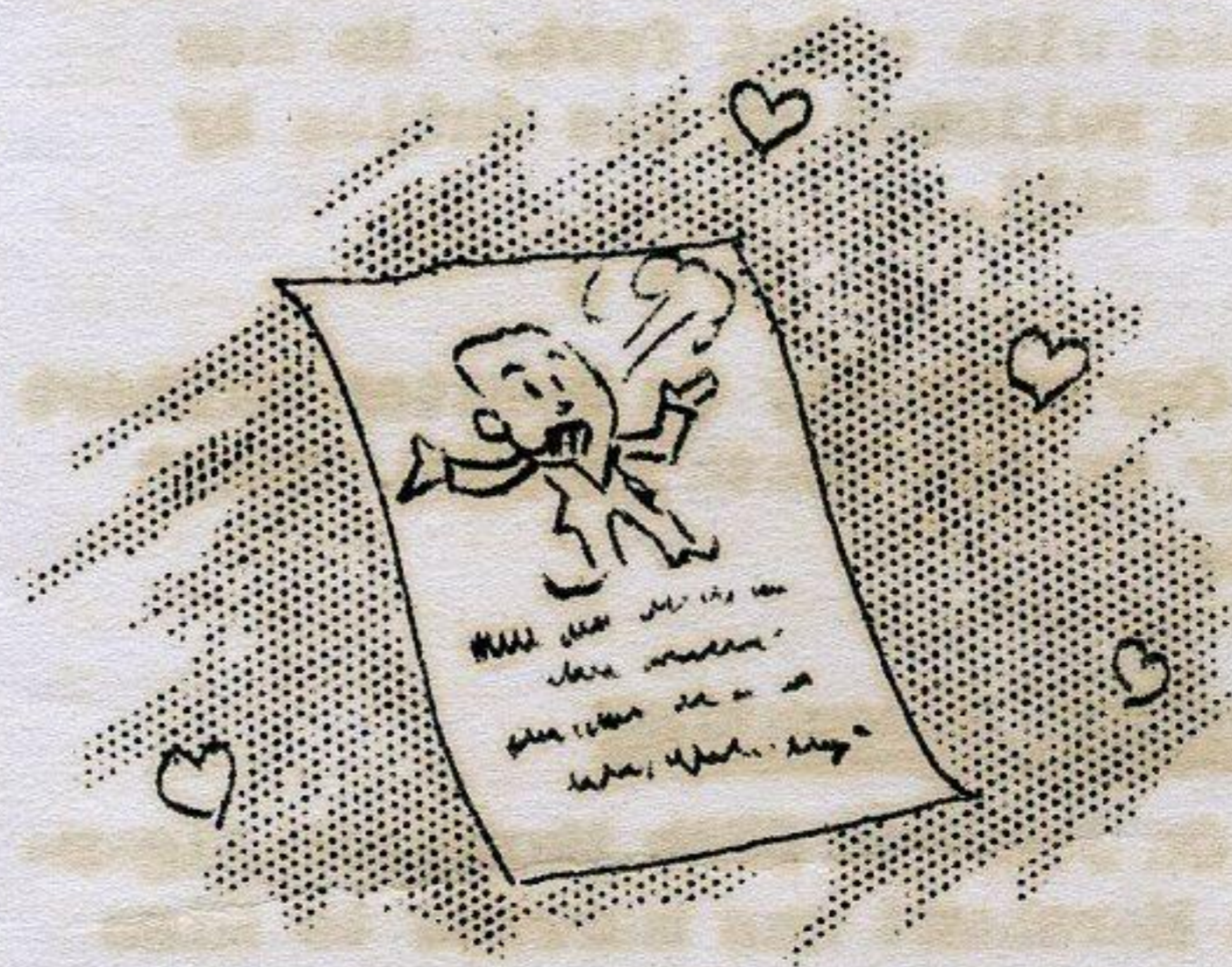

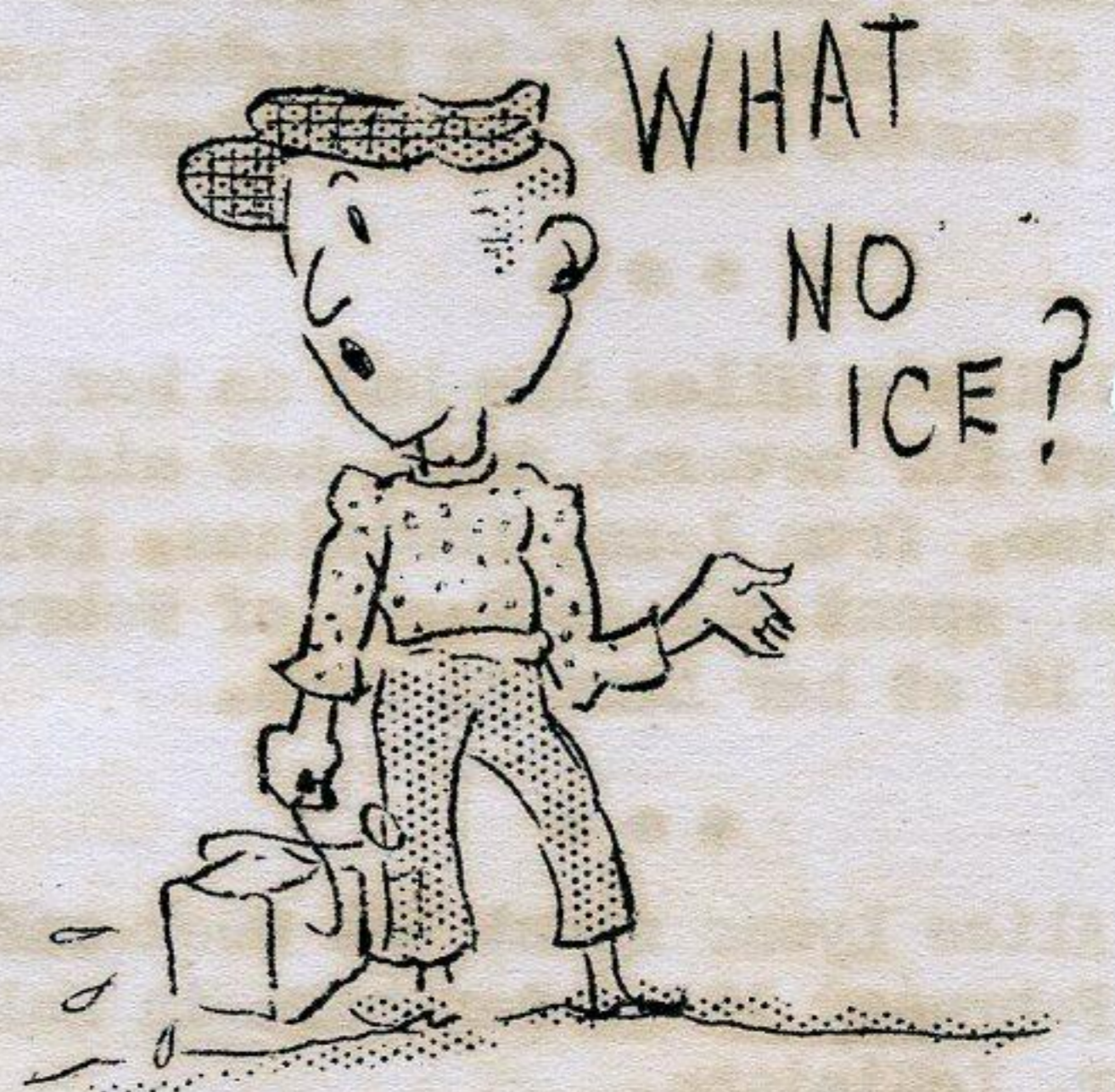

Liberty Territory: A test well is being drilled on W.T. Finley tract five miles west of Hardin; rig is being set up on James Knight survey northwest of Hardin and at Capers Ridge on west side of Trinity river.

There are three rigs running at Esperson Dome and one running one mile west of the Hankamer field. Another rig is operating about $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles northwest of the Hankamer field.

A well in vicinity of Kenefick on west side of Trinity river and northeast of Dayton is down 4,100 feet.

A deep test well in the South Liberty field is in pay sand and all indications point to a good well.

A recent pleasant surprise was the announcement of the marriage of J. O. Lively to Miss Pearl Talbert. Mr. & Mrs. Lively are

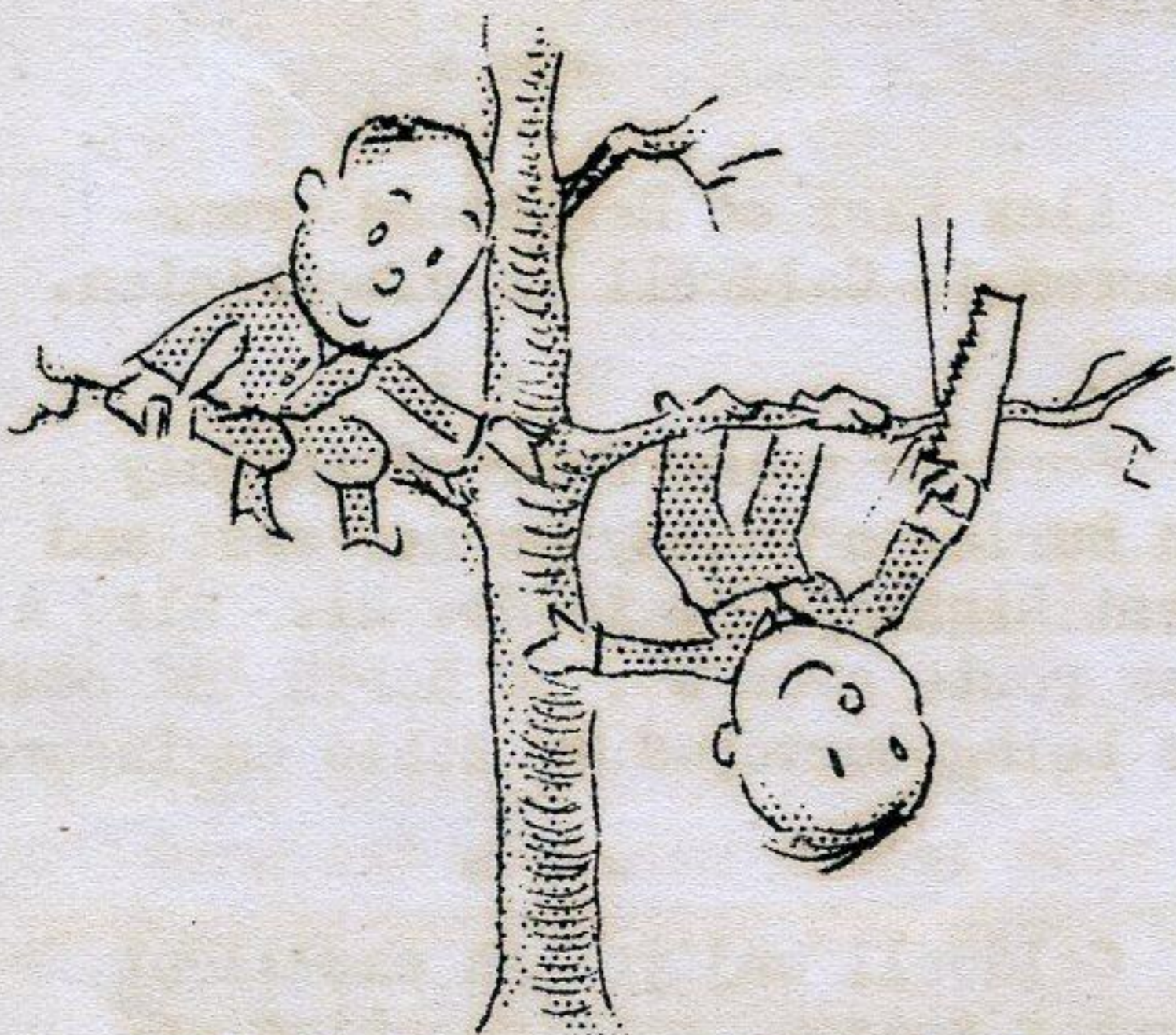

28 electric ranges have been sold to employees of Port Arthur Division since February 1.

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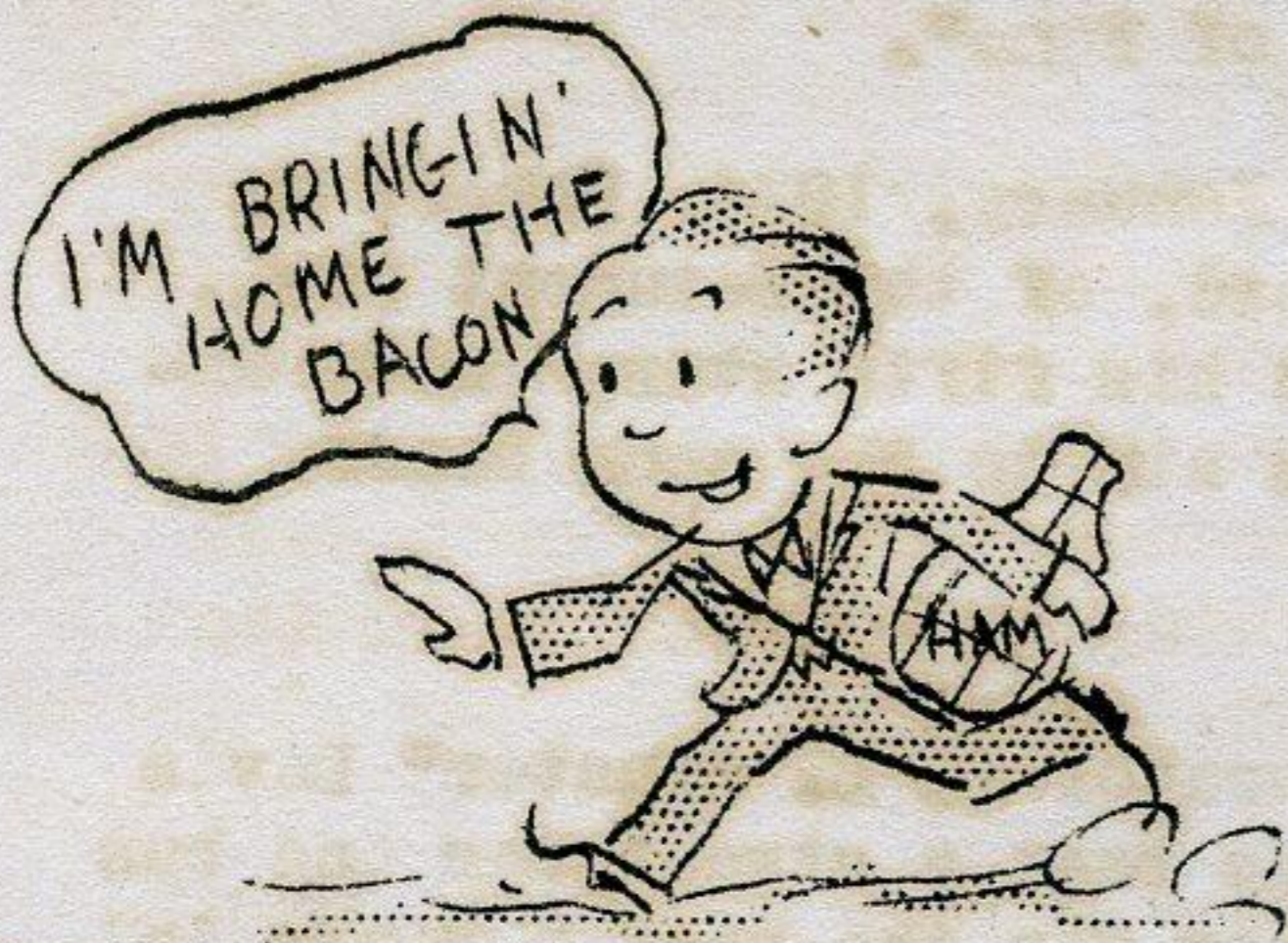

1933 saw a new low accident record established by E.T.E. Co. - all divisions, with a total of 348 accidents reported as against 378 for 1932. The following tabulation shows the past six years' accident figures for the Beaumont Division alone:

1930	-	679
1931	-	447
1932	-	338
1933	-	301

Beaumont Division had 159 no-accident days in 1933.

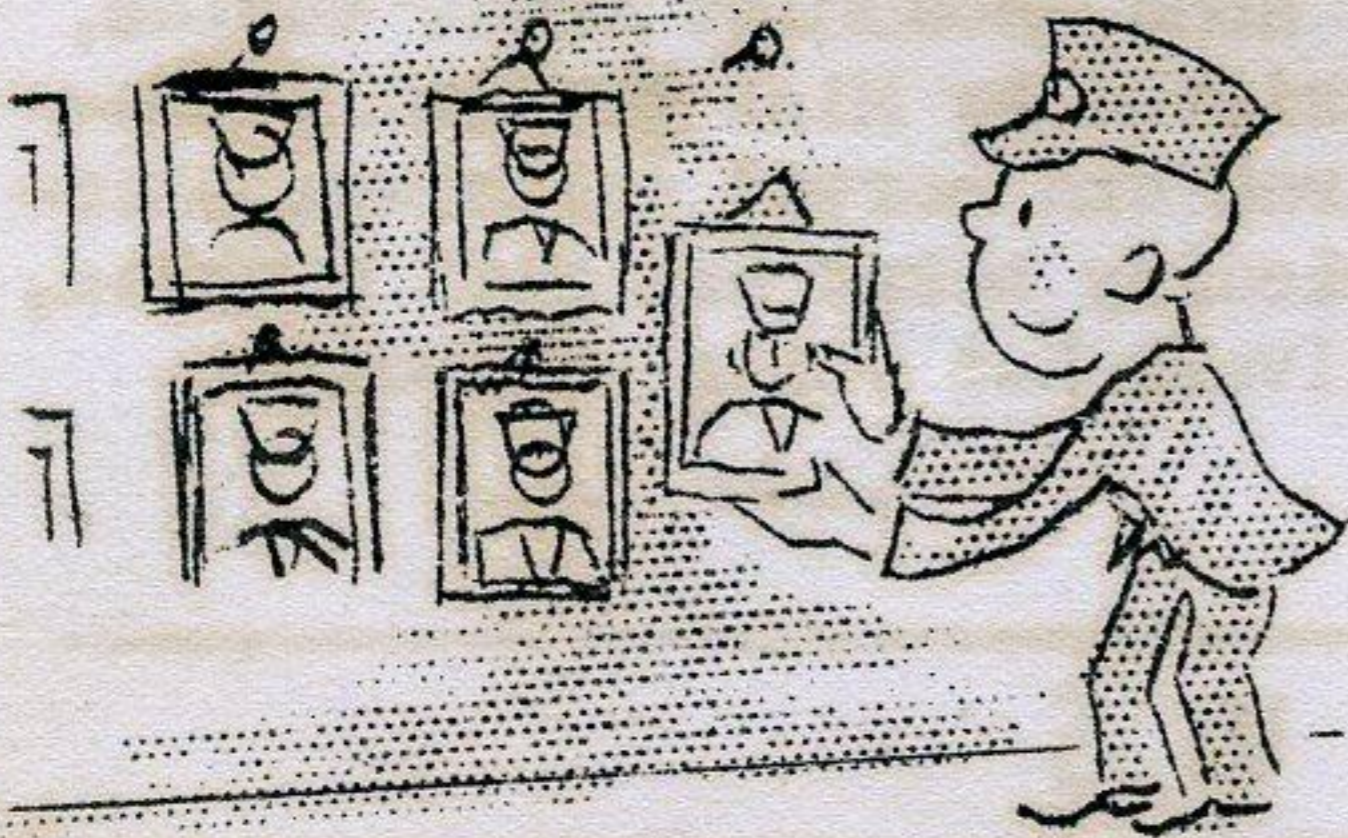
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Clyde A. Boyd, operator and supervisor in the Beaumont Div. for the past 12 years, has recently been transferred to the Port
